Ministry Outcomes

Master's Touch Ministry

- 51 men graduated Master's Touch Program
- 27 men graduated Greenawalt Learning Center
- 10 men completed “Designed for a Work”
- 22 graduates found full-time jobs
- 17 men reconciled with wife or family
- 39 men made professions of faith in Christ
- 13 men promoted to full-time resident assistants
- 1 man promoted to Resident Staff
- 7 men resided at our discipleship house The Horizon

Lifespring Ministry

- 55 women and 50 children served, a total of 26 families served
- 20% of women completed the year program
- 47% made a profession of faith or rededicated their life to Christ
- 88% showed remarkable improvement in communications skills
- 87% showed remarkable improvement in parenting skills
- 42% completed computer training classes
- 56% of Phase III clients obtained jobs
- Currently have contact with 45% of alumni

Hope Outreach

- Generated \$495,149 income from Hope Chest Store and the recycling of scrap metal, paper and clothing
- 40 men provided daily, real-life work experience
- 8 ministry vehicles maintained - logged 3,500+ miles/month
- Scheduled, transported, sorted, and refurbished over 300,000 donated articles of clothing, furniture, household goods and sundry items. These items were sold at the Hope Chest Resale Store or distributed to under-resourced men, women, and children in the community or residing at Wayside
- Collaborated with World Vision in Aurora providing clothing and housewares for 72 refugee families
- Assisted the local community through Community Outreach
- Provided 131 families with clothing, housewares and furniture
- Assisted Lifespring Center with maintenance needs
- Hosted by 10 local churches for Compassion Drives filling a WCM box truck with needed clothes and sundry items for Wayside's Community Outreach Programs
- 786 bales at 650 pounds each of clothing was recycled for third world developing countries

New Life Corrections Ministry

- Held worship services, Bible Studies, literature distribution, one-on-one counseling, parenting classes, and evangelism on a weekly basis in seven correctional facilities, and monthly in an eighth facility
- Had face-to-face, mostly one-on-one, gospel contact with over 1,500 un-duplicated inmates per month
- Welcomed 120 chaplains, volunteers and correctional staff to two jail ministry training seminars
- Expanded the Dads' Classes from just the Kane County Jail, to include the DuPage County Jail, the DeKalb County Jail, Stateville Prison, and the Master's Touch residents at Wayside Cross
- Graduated 121 men from our Dads' Classes
- Increased our volunteer involvement to over 150 volunteers
- Continued our Bible Correspondence Study Ministry

Elgin Wayside Center

- Meals served – 11,944
- Counseling appointments – 916
- Decisions for Christ – 28
- Distributed 3,562 clothing items and furniture to needy families
- Bible studies/chapel services held – 629 with 8,199 attendees
- Bibles and Christian literature dispersed – 390
- Total guests signed in - 8,608 (an average of 28 per day)

2010 DuPage Initiative

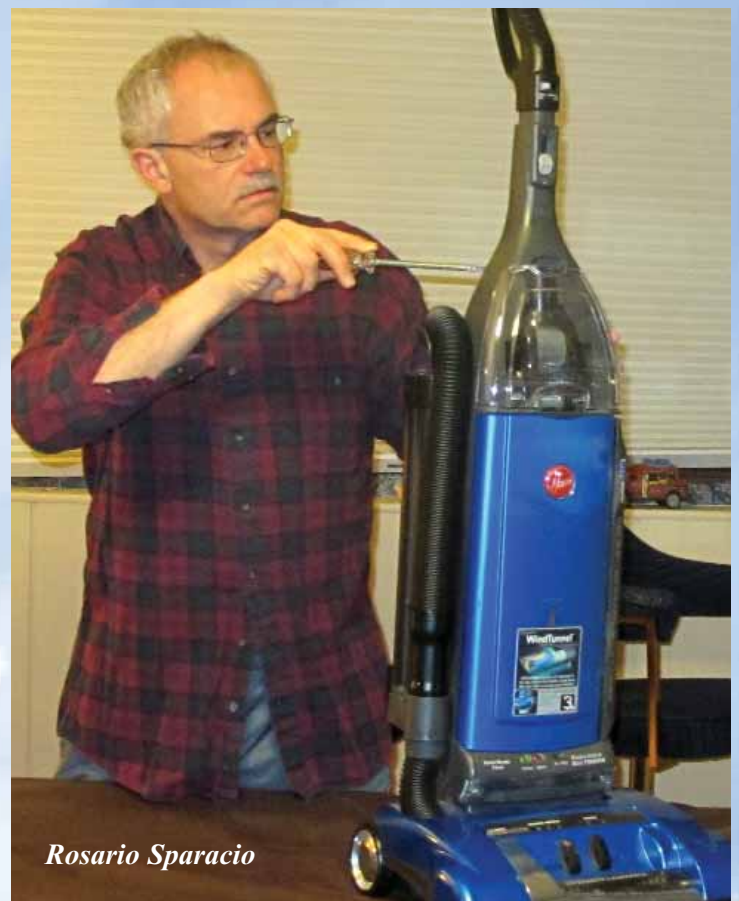

Life Stewardship Means Managing Your Time to Serve Others

Time is something we just don't seem to have enough of "So much to do; so little time". This is especially true of teens, with the demands of school and extra curricular activities.

But we all find time for what is truly important to us.

What is really important to Julio is reaching out to kids on Aurora's East-side, making a positive difference in their lives.

Julio is a young man who grew up on Aurora's East-side, playing in Wayside's Neighborhood Baseball League. Amidst growing up a teen in a gang infested neighborhood, Julio admits mistakes but endeavored to move forward athletically, academically, and professionally (by working part time). It was a severe automobile accident in Julio's sophomore year of High School that slowed him down. Spending a week in a coma, Julio awoke with severe brain damage.

Now at nineteen, Julio has zest to not only reclaim his life but to also sow seeds of truth and love into the lives of what would have ten years ago been his teammates. Julio states: "I want to give back to the kids some of what I have gotten," while playing in the ANBL. Julio is focusing on "pre-teens" because as Julio explains, gang recruitment begins in Middle School. Julio admits falling prey to gang intimidation and eventually membership. Yet he is determined to never turn back in that direction and to work with kids from his neighbor-

hood, teaching them the same lessons he was taught. Julio is now studying for completion of his High School degree and intends to continue coaching, while pursuing a career in sports therapy. Julio remembers the lessons that he learned in the ANBL and especially those taught by his coaches. Julio is now curious and optimistic about his future, particularly the role that God intends to play in his future.

Julio is making a positive difference in kid's lives.

Urban Youth Ministries greatest strength is its volunteers. God uses coaches and assistant coaches like Julio to remind the kids that their heavenly Father loves them and is present in their lives.

"Our greatest reward", states Scot Thurman, UYM Director, "is when players like Julio return with a desire to give back what they have received and invest in the lives of the next generation."

Life Stewardship Means Using Your Position to Influence Others

CB&I is a global engineering, procurement and construction company that believes in supporting the communities employees live and work in through community involvement. Like other businesses CB&I has participated in the United Way Combined Appeal Campaign for many years.

In addition, for several years as part of this campaign, CB&I has attempted to further a spirit of volunteerism among its employees by including opportunities for employees to volunteer their time and talents to help various non-profit organizations.

We all have ideas, talents, experiences and resources that we can use to encourage and serve others. Sharing yourself with others can bring great rewards. Jennifer Sheldon, a volunteer at Lifespring, shares her story.

“God called me to serve at Lifespring, and it has been one of the greatest gifts I have known. In retrospect I can see that it was a service for which He had been lovingly preparing me for most of my adult life.



I will continue with the afternoon studies, as well as add a Thursday night Bible Study (twice a month) with Deb Walsh. I will continue to serve as needed in the other areas. Despite being the kind of person who adores a consistent schedule and cherishes her comfort zone, I have learned to embrace the blissful ambiguity of the unknown concerning what better things God would have me do, and then embrace them as my own. I have learned to give thanks for the time, talent and

treasure God provides by endeavoring to joyfully pour them out into Lifespring, as well as other areas of my life. In all of this I have found that as much a blessing as I can be to staff and the ladies at Lifespring, so they are to me in return many times over. Having said all this, “God is good” truly becomes an understatement.

If anyone is encouraged by how God has worked in me and you feel the slightest call to serve at Wayside, I urge you to start today. If not, in one last effort to encourage you, I offer you the 3 passages of scripture that have been foundational to my service for many years: John 3:16 (from where I draw nourishment for my faith); 1 John 4:4 (the means by which I persevere); 1 John 4:19 (the reason I serve at Lifespring).”

I started in the Adopt-a-Friend Program and moved into organizing, cleaning and inventorying their storage closets. After meeting Deb Walsh at the autumn fundraiser, I joined her when her church group hosted Bunco night. Affording me the opportunity to come to know the women at Lifespring [staff and residents], and it created in me a desire to do more.

As I continued the cleaning and organizing, I began creating ‘Welcome Bags & Cards’ for the new ladies, as well as writing letters of encouragement, and including a special gift for their 6 month anniversary. I also attended all graduations.

I was asked to supervise for 2 nights during the holidays although I felt quite intimidated in choosing to serve in this manner, it was a great blessing from God during which a new desire was born. My new calling was the desire to be at Lifespring more regularly in order that I might know all the ladies; and to be encouraging in a more fruitful way. I started a Bible Study two afternoons a month, and the topic of the study I wrote was ‘Perseverance’. My increased participation allows me to know everyone’s name (including the children), to interact more conversationally in groups or one-on-one, and to come alongside new-comers more quickly. I can share how God has worked good in my life in both the difficult and the peaceful times, walk through the words of God and His promises, and experience mutual encouragement as proof that none of us are alone.

I am blessed with participation in the Phase 3 One-on-One Bible Study and know to the marrow of my soul that God has me doing what I was meant to do, and He is encouraging me to do more.

Bridge to Life Capital Campaign Up Date

Last spring Wayside Cross Ministries launched the Bridge to Life Capital Campaign to raise funds in the amount of \$7,478,868 to provide a new facility, additional staff and programming to serve the Master's Touch men's ministry. To date the campaign has raised funds in the amount of \$3.1 million dollars.

The focus of the campaign this spring is to approach key foundations with the goal of receiving a major challenge grant. If awarded this grant, it would be used to leverage donations from other foundations, corporations and individuals.

Thus far we have received grants to underwrite this capital project from several foundations. Others have demonstrated an interest in funding the project but are waiting in the wings until additional funds are raised ensuring the viability of the project. The campaign took a giant step forward at a Bridge to Life fund-raising event held on September 30, 2010 at the Aurora Country Club. Pledges and gifts collected that evening totaled \$930,000 with

additional proceeds expected. This was the result of 3 of our key ministry friends, and their willingness to use their talents, relationships and resources.

A construction committee is in place to immediately move forward with building construction as soon as 70% of the cost of construction is covered by funds raised. Two members of the committee have stepped forward to volunteer their time to service as Owners' Representatives overseeing the various phases of demolition and construction. This will provide thousands of dollars of savings.

We are thankful for the generous response to the campaign thus far. This would not be possible apart from God's blessing and the involvement and support of many caring, committed people.

To achieve this goal Wayside Cross will need the generous support of current donors—individuals—businesses—churches and hundreds of new contributors.

You are invited to participate and become a partner in making this vision a reality.

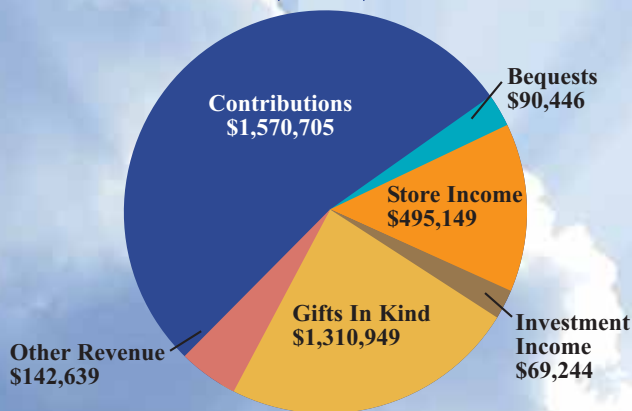

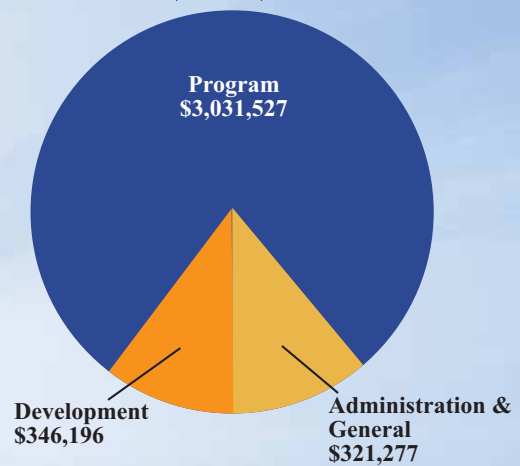
