

Jerry's Story

Jerry's adult life started out like a fairy tale, in his words, "it exceeded what I ever thought life would be like for me." He and his family lived in the same town for 26 years, he was married for 24 years and has two grown sons.

His problems started when he began to replace trouble in his marriage with alcohol. The more he drank, the more the problems compounded: he and his wife grew more and more apart which then led to divorce.

As life spiraled downhill for Jerry, he attempted suicide, not once, but twice. The second time he was rescued by a police officer but still, Jerry continued to drink. He had given up.

Jerry moved to Arizona and stayed at a homeless shelter. He met a man there who, to this day, he continues to be friends with. He helped Jerry find work and, in time, helped Jerry return to Illinois so he could be closer to what he knew as home.



Eventually, the drinking started up again. Jerry knew he had to do something. He had heard about Wayside Cross Ministries and knew that's where he needed to be.

Jerry is thankful for the path God laid out for him, even in the difficult times, to get him to where he is today. He speaks very highly of his mentor, Bob Wetterman, and is grateful for all Wayside has done for him but he is particularly grateful for the Christ-centered, Bible-based teachings that the Master's Touch program has given him. His foundation in Christ is strengthened. His biggest lessons learned: humility and patience. And he knows this could not have been done without God and without people who care and give to WCM.

Life has changed dramatically for Jerry. He has been volunteering at a local recreational sports center and, most recently, was hired to work with special needs children, which is his background, at

a local school district. He will remain at Wayside as a resident working outside the facility. He recently contacted his sons and together, they are working on restoring their relationships. He will be graduating from the Master's Touch program this month and is hopeful his two sons will be attending.

Jerry is thankful for the kindness of the donors and those who volunteer at WCM to come alongside the men and help them become stronger in their faith. Jerry says, "my footwork is solid because of how I have been surrounded with the Word, the people, and a great God."
