Fulfilling the Great Commission and the Greatest Commandment

Believe it or not, we are at the 90 year mark at Wayside Cross Ministries.

Although many things have changed over the years, our purpose and core values have not. We remain faithful to the Great Commission and the Greatest Commandment by empowering those in deep despair with affliction in their lives.

In 1927, after a six-week revival held by evangelist Billy Sunday, the Aurora Ministerial Alliance began discussions about the need for a rescue mission in Aurora. During the week of June 10th, 1928, Wayside Cross Rescue Mission had

its official beginning. The timely birth of the ministry was very effective; the timelessness of its purpose has spanned generations through the churches, local Christian business owners, and the faithful donors.

God's goodness has allowed the once "Wayside Cross Rescue Mission" to evolve into today's Wayside Cross Ministries (WCM), with six distinct divisions serving the needs of the greater Chicagoland area and beyond. When people come to WCM, most have no purpose, they have no objectives, and they often have little to no support. In Galatians 5:14, Paul articulates the Greatest Commandment in one verse, *"For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'"* Over the past 90 years, WCM has been obedient to this call – loving our neighbors who are in real need, but we couldn't have done that without you.

This reminds me of how the Apostle Paul confirmed to his fellow apostles, *his* eagerness to meet the needs of the poor:

All they asked was that we should continue to remember the poor, the very thing I had been eager to do all along. Galatians 2:10

Looking back on the past 90 years, we never cease to be amazed by the fact that there are thousands of ministry friends who helped and empowered us to be faithful in remembering the poor, year after year. We give our heartfelt thanks to you for doing so eagerly.

Without the timeliness of the churches' response to the need for a rescue mission 90 years ago, and the timelessness of our purpose and core values, there would be no Wayside Cross Ministries today. Over the years, WCM has experienced changes in leadership, personnel, programs and its facilities. What remains steadfast is our commitment to help the helpless, provide compassion for the hurting, instill hope for the afflicted, and above all, encourage transformation through reconciliation with our Lord Jesus Christ.

As you read this year's Stewardship Report, may you recognize the thread of faithfulness that has extended over the past 90 years, and find confidence in the knowledge that our purpose has not changed. Most importantly, numerous lives have been transformed because of the unwavering story of redemption in Jesus Christ. We are excited and look forward to serving Christ together in the next 90 years. We count on your support and prayers.

These items were sold at the Hope Chest Resale Store, Sweet Charity Resale Store or distributed to under-resourced men, women, and children in the community or within one of Wayside's ministries
- Through our Community Outreach program, assisted local churches with 106 family referrals for clothing, housewares and furniture
- Collaborated with World Relief in Aurora to provide clothing and housewares for 57 refugee families
- 1,056 bales at 800 lbs. each of clothing and 553 bags of shoes at 50 lbs. each were recycled with the majority of those items going to third world/developing countries
- Partnered with 4 local churches to host Compassion Drives with the purpose of collecting clothes, furniture, and other household items that could be used in our Hope Chest Resale Store as well as other areas of our ministries
- Operated 19 donation bins at partner churches, collecting 13,382 bags of donated clothing, weighing 294,404 lbs
- Proceeds from our Hope Chest Resale Store, Sweet Charity Resale Shop, along with our income from recycling clothing, shoes, and scrap metal totaled \$565,710, all of which went to fund the ministry efforts at Wayside Cross Ministries



Heritage Society Exceeds 500 Members

The Wayside Cross Ministries Heritage Society, created to honor loyal, long-time donors, has reached 531 members. As of the end of 2017, total member donations is 44,963, amounting to many millions of dollars.

Many of the Heritage Society members are monthly donors, creating a strong flow of dollars each month, a significant blessing in slower months as a large amount of WCM donations are received at the end of the year.

Thanks to the sacrificial and generous support of the Heritage Society members, Wayside continues to grow and serve more people.

Rewards Begin with a Daily Walk with Christ

The Great Commission and Greatest Commandment are embedded in WCM's Mission Statement: "To honor God by loving and serving the afflicted and powerless through sharing the Gospel of forgiveness and hope in Jesus Christ by empowering them to be disciples of Christ." Further, they are integrated into our Master's Touch Ministry (WCM's residential program for men) by various program elements, meeting the physical needs (food, clothing, and housing) of our men, as well as their spiritual needs (Bible classes, chapel services, mentoring, and church partnerships).

In discipling our residents, we impress upon them the importance of fulfilling the Great Commission and Greatest Commandment



in their own lives. To that end, on the first Wednesday of every month, Master's Touch Director Randy Tomassi presents the "Resident of the Month Award." The recipient is the man whose daily walk with Christ reflects, in the collective judgment of his fellow residents and WCM staff, not only our Mission Statement, but our Core Values (Christ-likeness, Compassion, Commitment, Collaboration, and Community), as well.

The "award ceremony" is a suspense-filled event attended by a "standing room only" audience of residents, staff, and volunteers, whose respectful silence erupts into a spontaneous, raucous standing ovation as soon as Director Tomassi completes the sentence "And the winner is…"

In December, 2016, it was Shaun's name in the envelope. Shaun had entered the Master's Touch program in June of that year. He had previously served eight years in the US Army as a helicopter engine mechanic, but as a result of years of alcohol abuse, his life had become unmanageable. While a Master's Touch resident, Shaun experienced the transforming power of Jesus Christ. After graduating from the program in January, 2017, Shaun spent a few months working in the Aurora area until November of 2017, at which time Shaun joined the WCM Staff as a Cashier/Team Leader in our Hope Chest resale store.

Shaun is very thankful for his Resident of the Month "prize winnings," which comprised "first in line" privileges in our dining hall for all meals during his "reign," and a gift card redeemable at WCM's Hope Chest resale store. Further, his color portrait was also prominently displayed across our campus. More importantly, however, Shaun is thankful for the opportunity afforded him <u>every</u> month to serve as a witness to Our Lord Jesus Christ's transforming power in his life!



A Changed Life

Before getting arrested, I was a thief and a drug addict, stealing from anyone and everyone so I could get high. When I got arrested for burglary, I was sent to Cook County jail.

In jail, I enrolled in Gateway, a behavior modification and drug abuse program. Once the drugs were out of my system, I excelled in the program. I started to take a look at the cause of my problem and realized I was spiritually dead. I didn't believe there was a God that could love me, an addict and thief. I started attending Willow Creek Chapel service on Monday night in jail. After several months I received God's gift and turned my life over to Jesus.

I still had to face the court. I was sentenced to 10 years for burglary and I went to Dixon Correctional Center to serve my time. While in



prison I attended the *Freedom From Fear* seminar, taught by Chaplain Steve Madawick and his team of volunteers. Chaplain Steve told me about the aftercare program at Master's Touch, a division of Wayside Cross Ministries. I made the decision to take a chance and change my life.

I came to Wayside Cross Ministries after my release in August 2017. While at Wayside, my life changed for the better. I learned to read and study the Bible which helped me have a positive attitude; as a result, my faith has grown. God has blessed me with a cure for my Hepatitis-C diagnosis, and He has given me favor in getting my driver's license.

I graduated from the Master's Touch program in February. Upon graduating the program, I went into Phase 4, which allows me to work at an outside job and still live at Wayside. Chaplain Steve introduced me to John Lessik, President of Apex Wood Floors. Apex is partnering with Wayside to provide graduates an opportunity to develop a career in the wood floor industry – Apex is now my place of employment. Additionally, I am looking forward to becoming involved at Highpoint Church where John is an Elder, and to attending Chaplain Steve's Bible study on Wednesday nights.

Thanks to my time studying the Bible, I have a favorite verse. It is Romans 12:2 - Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. God has transformed me. God never gives up on us!

Aurora Community Teaches Students: You Are Valuable

Judy Durham is a lifelong Aurora resident, an East High School alumna, and is a Special Education Job Coach at East Aurora High School District 131. A contract from the Illinois Department of Human Services helps fund the S.T.E.P Work Program (Secondary Transitional Education Program). These students (high school through age 21) learn social skills, work and life skills. This program has three components: a classroom component, hands-on training, and career development.

Since 2011, Judy has brought 6-10 S.T.E.P. students twice per week to serve at our Hope Chest Resale Store, where they are allowed to learn and work within their own abilities. "Hope Chest is a community training ground," says Judy. "Our students are able to develop personally, with the goal of moving toward a more demanding job and, ultimately, toward self-sufficiency."

Wayside resident workers respond with excitement in seeing high school students working and "giving back." Judy says that our residents encourage them like "big brothers" to stay in school, stay focused, and to persevere when things don't go well. "They laugh and joke with our students, make them feel comfortable, and are like a family to us."

Judy reminds us that "our Aurora community needs our students to learn to give back, because it opens their heart to helping other less fortunate people." She reminds her students that "just because you have a disability doesn't mean you aren't valuable." We concur, and are blessed to have Judy and her students serve our community with us!
