## Hope Outreach

Provides the men in the program daily, real-life work experience. Enhancing or learning new skills in our warehouse, transportation department, maintenance shop, housekeeping department, Hope

Chest Resale Store, Sweet Charity Resale Shop, Hope Chest Resale Store Elgin and Hope On Wheels

- Maintained 8 ministry vehicles with an average of 6,000 miles per month
- Scheduled, transported, sorted and refurbished over 500,000 donated items including clothing, furniture, household goods and other miscellaneous objects. These items were sold at the Hope Chest Resale Stores, Sweet Charity Resale Shop or distributed to under-resourced men, women and children in the community or within one of Wayside Cross' divisions
- Through our Community Outreach program and World Relief Aurora, we assisted local churches with 19 referrals for clothing and housewares
- 1,162 bales at over 800 lbs. each of clothing and 940 bags of shoes, for a total of 891,261 lbs. were recycled with the majority of those items going to third-world/ developing countries
- Partnered with 4 local churches to host Compassion Drives with the purpose of collecting clothes, furniture, and other household items that could be used in our Hope Chest Resale Stores as well as other areas of our ministries
- Operated 20 donation bins at partner churches, collecting 8,528 bags of donated clothing, weighing 187,616 lbs.
- Proceeds from our Hope Chest Resale Stores, Sweet Charity Resale Shop, and Hope On Wheels, along with our income from recycling clothing, shoes, and scrap metal totalled \$802,250, all of which went to fund the ministry efforts at Wayside Cross Ministries

# New Life Corrections Ministry

- Went to Stateville Prison 14 times, with over 150 inmates visited
- Handed out 600 Bibles in jails and prisons
- Had over 75 volunteers come to our two training sessions
- Passed out over 5,000 Dads and Freedom From Fear brochures to inmates
- Passed out 200 books and pamphlets to inmates

## **Urban Youth Ministry**

- 111 kids played in our Aurora Neighborhood Baseball League (59 Little League and 52 T-Ball)
- Each elementary-aged child received 26 hours of academic support through our after school program
- 3,583 free meals were served to UYM kids in 2021
- 60 people attended Cinderella at the Paramount Theater, completely free of charge
- 934 Summer volunteer hours served by over 50 volunteers
- 155 hours of Bible lessons taught in 2021
- 4 boys and 1 girl trained and competed in the sport Hammer Throw free of charge
- Collaborated with 50 churches and organizations
- 67 students received summer camp programming through June and July
- 110 days of transportation provided to UYM kids





# God Does Show You What's Good

In December 2020, Veronica Cunalata entered a drug rehabilitation center to end the three-year drug cycle that had caused her life to spin out of control. When she entered rehab, she had lost custody of her two young children, accumulated considerable debt, and her relationship with Jesus was non-existent.

After she completed rehab and regained custody of her daughter, Gabi, her father told her about Lifespring's transitional housing program for women in crisis who need a fresh start. She was hesitant to join a "program," but she quickly adapted to the routine at Lifespring and felt welcomed by the staff and residents.

Contrary to what most residents say about Lifespring's policy of not having a cell phone in the first 30 days, Veronica enjoyed the break. "It gave me time to focus on myself and my daughter," said Veronica. "I also enjoyed learning more about the Lord."

Now that she has been sober for one year and is in a relationship with Christ, she hopes to regain custody of her son soon.

She plans to re-enter the workforce as she approaches the last phase of the program, and has already secured childcare for Gabi when the time comes. Her goals are to one day be a police officer, be the best mom possible to her children, be a spiritual leader and teach her children about God and how to follow Him.

# Something to Be Thankful For...



The son of a Vietnam veteran, Kenny grew up in a small community. He started using drugs as a teenager. He married in his twenties and had two sons. His habits ruined his most important relationships. At the height of his addiction, his wife left with their children. Shortly after, Kenny was arrested and sentenced to 16 years in jail.

While in prison he heard his older son had been imprisoned for drug use, Kenny was determined to make a lasting change.

The mother of his cellmate was a dedicated follower of Christ. He heard the gospel from this woman and wondered about Jesus. In a moment of utter brokenness, covered in the prayer of this mother, Kenny accepted the Gospel of Jesus Christ. And the transforming work of the Holy Spirit began making a lasting change a reality. Kenny connected with Wayside and entered the Master's Touch program upon his parole.

He says, "I have to admit, I was a little nervous when I first arrived, but the minute I walked through the door, I felt like I had a home. I felt complete peace. Everyone made me feel welcome. It's almost like I had a hedge of protection around me."

Kenny has been diligently encouraging his son - making regular calls and working with our chaplain to ensure his son's transfer to Master's Touch upon his release.

Today, Kenny is a full-time staff member in the ministry. He works as the Kitchen Coordinator – overseeing the production of 210,000 meals a year. His leadership abilities have become more and more evident as he is being continuously transformed by Christ. His willingness to share his story encouraged many others.

Arriving at Lifespring she remembers her quick temper. She butted heads often with staff. She sees now they were trying to help her see a bigger picture and she learned that takes time and the empowerment of Jesus Christ.

Billie received Jesus as her Savior and Lord and her attitude began to change. She is now learning the great value of patience and stability. She is working full time as a CNA. Providing for her family and finding great joy in building relationships with her patients.

Billie says, "The light at the end of the tunnel is right here." Her two

boys were returned to her, Billie's family was complete. The stability of her family and the love she has for her children is now rooted in the only constant in any of our lives - Jesus Christ. She is focused on walking God's way. She has walked the path of destruction and has chosen the path of life - toward the only true Light there is.

This past year, under unprecedented circumstances, VBC not only never missed a beat serving UYM kids but even gave more. # God Works With the Humble and Merciful

Bradford came into the Master's Touch men's program at Wayside in January of 2020. For several months before that, he had been working with the Elgin Day Center's staff, who had been helping him grow in his faith.



When I met Bradford, he was working with DuPage County Jail on a DUI charge. I began helping him work with his lawyer to get into Drug Court, a year-plus program which allows inmates to get the necessary help never to use drugs again. Through his studies at Wayside he learned that it was Jesus and His Word that gave him the foundation to get free from drug addiction. I mentored him during his time at Wayside, where he became focused on his recovery program, meetings, and being around the right people.

After having lost his father at an early age, Bradford had begun to use and sell drugs in his teen years. After some jail time, he came to know Iesus and had some good years. He got married, but the marriage didn't work out and led to more drug use and broken family ties. When he came to Chicago to work for his sister, he got into trouble with the law. Here he joined a secular recovery program where he learned about Wayside.

Bradford graduated from Wayside in July of 2021. NICOR selected him to join their training program. He went into Phase 4 and was able to work outside of the program while still living at Wayside for several months, saving money to pay off his court fines. I continue to mentor Bradford as he had the opportunity to leave Wayside and live in a Discipleship home with other Christian men in Bolingbrook.

Bradford has learned to be humble and show mercy through serving those who need a second chance. He attends Highpoint Church in Romeoville and is deeply involved with the Hope Group Recovery program. His faith is solid, and he wants to continue to grow and help other men find freedom from addiction. He's reconciled with his family and now enjoys spending time with them. He also has opened the door for other men in DuPage County Jail to come to Wayside and work through Drug Court probation and avoid prison. His favorite verse is 2 Cor 5:7.

# You Know It When You See It

Micah 6:8 is a familiar verse that many can quote from memory. We cannot miss the resounding "And what does the Lord require of you?" as it prods and challenges us toward introspective self-examination. We ask, "Am I acting justly, loving mercy, and walking humbly with God?"

Around Wayside, some residents have never read this verse and are unaware that these words even exist. Most enter our doors with little knowledge of the Gospel, the Christian life, or the Bible. For some, though, it is apparent the Lord is at work.

Insert the humorous adage, "If it looks like a duck, swims like a duck, and quacks like a duck, then it probably is a duck!" The implication is that a person can identify an unknown subject by observing that subject's habitual characteristics. When we apply this observation to our program residents, we see Micah 6:8 being lived out right before our very eyes! Better put, they are producing good "fruit" as they are attached to the vine, lesus.

Even during their recovery, they live out this challenge daily as they interact with other residents. We observe friendships, men mentoring men, and accountability in action. Knowing where they came from and their weakness and propensity to fall, they implore one another towards clear thinking as they struggle with desires to return to the addictions that brought them here. They truly are "acting justly, loving mercy, and walking humbly."

# WCM's 2021 Capital Improvement Projects

With the help of three very generous foundations, we have completed multiple capital improvement projects. The funding included a collaboration between the Dunham Foundation and the Community Foundation of the Fox River Valley through a challenge grant, which helped make some significant improvements at Lifespring Center, and a grant from an anonymous donor that also helped make substantial improvements.



We installed 26 Fan Coil AC/Heat units throughout Lifespring's building. These units provide cooling and heating year round.



Two new boilers were installed to provide emergency redundancy, which will provide coverage if an outage occurs during sub-zero temperatures. The system alternates between boilers and uses both when temperatures demand.



New piping insulation installed throughout the basement at Lifespring, which remedied the continuing condensation issues.



At our Maintenance Shop a service door and a roll up door were installed, which allows our Maintenance Vehicle and plow to be parked inside.

Also, included in our capital improvements were double doors for our Warehouse and Compactor areas. Tuck-pointing and masonry work on exterior brick, sills, and lintels is complete.
