Furthermore, we have rejoiced as the Lord provided a 21,000 square foot building in Elgin and a new four-story building to add to our New York Street Campus. He has been kind to us as we have been able to add two new discipleship homes for our Master's Touch graduates and three thrift stores to bless our communities, even a car detailing facility [Hope On Wheels] as a job-training opportunity for our residents.

We must not forget how faithful He has been. He has given us the ability to reach countless men and women in prisons and jails across the state with the love of Christ. He has led us to create a safe haven for addicted and abused women at the Lifespring Center. We are thankful for how He granted us the opportunity to minister to homeless and under-resourced individuals at the Elgin Wayside Center. Who could have imagined how impactful our Urban Youth Ministry would become for under-resourced and single parents as we provided their children with educational support and recreation, especially during a prolonged pandemic? Even still, God uses Wayside to give these kids a safe place to go while their parents work to keep a roof over their heads.

I never could have imagined I would get to witness God's power at work when I first walked through the doors of WCM 25 years ago. Looking back, I can say with certainty that the Lord has supported Wayside abundantly through the faithfulness of charitable donors like you, and for that we are eternally grateful.

As an organization that belongs to the Lord, we would like to thank you for playing a vital role in His work here. We hope and pray that your continued support will empower us to be a beacon of light and that many more lives would be transformed through the Gospel of Christ.

As you peruse these pages, we trust you will discover example after example of just how blessed and encouraged each of our six ministry divisions has been from your support. May you be reminded of Jesus' kindness as you gaze upon the redemption and hope that have been brought to countless numbers of souls here since 1928. Master's Touch Ministry

- 27 men graduated the Master's Touch program
- 3 men promoted to full-time resident assistants
- 3 men promoted to resident staff
- 39 men made professions of faith in Christ
- 165 men met weekly with a mentor
- 26 men found full time jobs

Lifespring Ministry

- 20 volunteers led weekly Bible-based and life skills classes
- 2 pastoral counselors met with residents on a weekly basis
- 20 mentors met weekly with assigned residents
- 25 residents entered the program; 5 residents graduated from the 6-month program
- 13 children joined the program alongside their mothers
- 4 residents made a profession of faith, and 13 residents grew in their faith
- 18 residents made significant improvements in their life skills

Elgin Wayside Center

Hope Outreach

- Provides the men in the program daily, real-life work experience. Enhancing or learning new skills in our warehouse, transportation

department, maintenance shop, housekeeping department, Hope Chest Resale Store, Sweet Charity Resale Shop, Hope Chest Resale Store Elgin and Hope On Wheels

- Maintained 8 ministry vehicles with an average of 6,000 miles per month
- Scheduled, transported, sorted and refurbished over 500,000 donated items including clothing, furniture, household goods and other miscellaneous objects. These items were sold at the Hope Chest Resale Stores, Sweet Charity Resale Shop or distributed to under-resourced men, women and children in the community or within one of Wayside Cross' divisions
- Through our Community Outreach program and World Relief Aurora, we assisted local churches with 19 referrals for clothing and housewares
- 1,136 bales at over 800 lbs. each of clothing and 1,186 bags of shoes, for a total of 911,713 lbs. were recycled with the majority of those items going to third-world/developing countries
- Partnered with 3 local churches to host Compassion Drives with the purpose of collecting clothes, furniture, and other household items that could be used in our Hope Chest Resale Stores as well as other areas of our ministries
- Operated 20 donation bins at partner churches, collecting 22,165 bags of donated clothing, weighing 487,630 lbs.
- Proceeds from our Hope Chest Resale Stores, Sweet Charity Resale Shop, and Hope On Wheels, along with our income from recycling clothing, shoes, and scrap metal totalled \$944,728, all of which went to fund the ministry efforts at Wayside Cross Ministries

New Life Corrections Ministry

- Went to Stateville Prison 50 times, with over 1,000 inmates visited
- Handed out 2,400 Bibles in jails and prisons
- Had over 80 volunteers come to our two prison training sessions
- Passed out over 13,000 Dads and Freedom From Fear brochures to inmates
- Passed out 1,000 books and pamphlets to inmates
- Opened up Sheridan Prison in July, doing Freedom From Fear Classes
- Opened up Kewanee Prison in December

Urban Youth Ministry

- 19 Students got to experience indoor skydiving for the first time
- 92 Volunteers gave approximately 1000 total hours of their time
- 107 Hours of Bible lessons were taught
- 200 Youth played in UYM's Aurora Neighborhood Baseball League
- 43 Hours of Tutoring and Homework help per student
- 115 Days of Free transportation to UYM programs for 75% of participants
- 18 Students attended a 5 day/4 night Bible Camp
- 623 Individual gifts were donated to our Christmas Merit Store
- 250 Collective volunteer hours were given by 25 UYM students

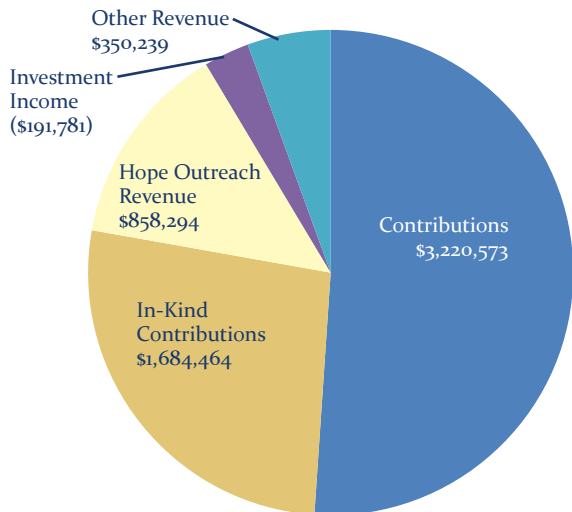

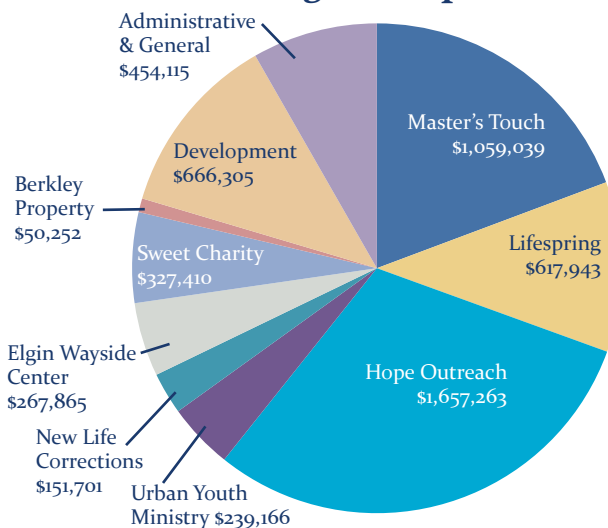

Receiving God's Blessings in His Timing

Meet Dineah - a single mom to four children ages 14, 11, 5, and 3. Dineah arrived at Lifespring one year ago in January 2022 after leaving an abusive relationship. At that time, her children's father had absconded with her kids, and Dineah had to petition to regain custody of her children.

But the road ahead would not be easy for Dineah. Regaining custody required her to make multiple trips to the courthouse in Chicago from Aurora. She made a total of 12 trips into the city, carrying car seats for her two youngest on the train each time. After the first 11 trips, she returned to Lifespring empty-handed and broken-hearted, but she never gave up hope. "After the first few trips, I started to feel defeated," said Dineah. "But then I realized I had to wait for God to bring them to me in His way and in His timing."

Today, Dineah has full custody of the kids, and they are all under one roof, rebuilding a life together with the help of Lifespring. Not only has her family been restored, she is learning important life skills and Biblical truths.

"This program has helped me learn to be better organized, stick to a budget, and find ways to spend quality time with my kids without spending money," says Dineah. "My walk with God has grown in so many ways, and the kindness and compassion of the staff has allowed me to truly start over again."

God's blessings in Dineah's life are so clearly evident – not just in the smiling faces of her children, but in the beautiful fruit that has grown out of her faith.

Many improvements were realized this past year. We finally replaced our “dying” convection oven with a larger, more efficient model. We also replace an exhaust fan in our kitchen, thanks to a dedicated gift from a gracious donor. We expanded the hours and presence of our staff this year, which helps to ensure full coverage throughout the week and to do even more to meet the ever-growing needs of the men and women we serve.

Finally, and perhaps most importantly, we have had multiple clients, struggling with life on the street, visiting our facility on a daily basis, who reached a point of surrender and agreed to transition to our residential programs in Aurora. This is real evidence of the Lord’s hand in what we do. Our goal, whether in Elgin or Aurora, is to see lives transformed through the power of the resurrected Christ. This is why we exist and in doing so, to bring glory and honor to His name (Phil. 2:9-11).

Opportunities that are given to kids in Urban Youth Ministry programs are provided by the God who sees their needs. Diego arrived at Urban Youth Ministry's after-school program in 2015. He was a Brady elementary 3rd-grade student and an only child of a single mom. Diego was a very quiet boy even though he attended our program with four of his cousins. Diego did not only participate in UYM's after-school program; He also attended summer camp and winter camp through his sophomore year in high school. During this time, he received numerous opportunities through UYM.

The first was his involvement in The Fox Valley Orchestra El Sistema youth program. Diego received a free violin and free lessons in 4th grade where he learned his love for music. Today as a junior, Diego plays the saxophone in the East Aurora High School band. Numerous times He received free winter coats and birthday boxes and gifts from organizations like Northern Illinois Gas company, The Birthday Giving Program, and Boxes of Balloons. In 2018, Diego was part of a CNN special news story featuring The Birthday Giving Program.

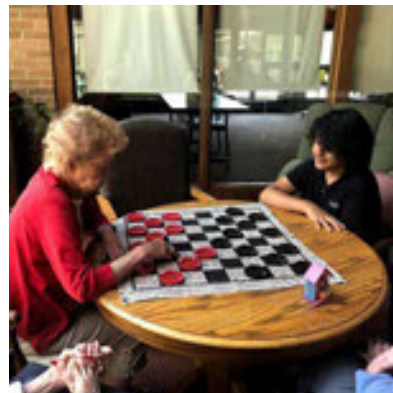
Diego attended several musicals provided by the Paramount Theatre. The Fox Valley Park District Foundation sponsored free swimming lessons, where he learned to swim! He has volunteered at Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry, Jennings Terrace, Ed Huss Farm and helped at UYM's Walk-A-Mile and "A Night of Hope" fundraising events.

In 2019, Diego went on a Boundary Waters trip in upper Minnesota with the Harvest New Beginning Church Youth group, where he learned to live outside and travel in a canoe with no modern world amenities. The goal was to grow closer to God and to understand the importance of teamwork.

Through UYM Diego received information on The Young Eagles Flight program, and today, he is planning to attend college to become a pilot. The reality for Diego is that any pilot school would require good grades and would be very expensive. Diego has participated in UYM after-school tutoring and mentoring programs for 8 years and has maintained an A average every year. As far as tuition for college...he joined Hammerman a local Hammer Throw program after he tried it out during UYM summer camp in 2019. He is now in his fourth year of competition and is being pursued by several colleges offering scholarships in track and field, one being Lewis University where they have a wonderful pilot program.

The most important opportunity Diego received during UYM programs happened during summer camp in 2017 when he accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior! The God who sees gets all the glory for the opportunities UYM kids receive while attending UYM programs.

This year our UYM middle and high school students were invited to attend Family & Youth Bible Camp in Cedar Lake, Indiana. Aware of the needs of UYM kids, the FYBC decided to award UYM with 10 scholarships, each with a value of \$340.00 for 4 nights and 5 days of camp from July 24 to July 28, 2022. In addition to the 10 scholarships, our amazing donors that attended our April UYM banquet covered 4 more spots. Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good! With only 14 paid camp tuitions to give out and almost 20 students wanting to attend, the students were challenged to meet certain criteria to qualify to attend camp. The students accumulated points while attending UYM day camp during the months of June and July for attendance, academics, volunteering, and good behavior. However, we had only 14 tuitions to give out. We reached out again to our UYM donors, and once again they met our needs and provided for the 4 tuitions. **PRAISE THE LORD, FOR HE IS GOOD!**

Our UYM students were on their way to a week they would not soon forget. There were so many “firsts” for our students. They stayed in dorms that were chaperoned by college students. They attended activities like rock climbing, canoeing, swimming in a lake, sitting by a campfire, participating in a talent show, and playing “messy” games. The most impactful time for them was the time they spent growing

closer to Jesus. They attended 2 hours of Bible time in the morning and then 1 hour each evening, learning about Sampson and Delilah, as well as worshipping the Lord through music. The Bible teachers at FYBC shared the Gospel clearly with UYM students, which was evident in their behavior, choice of music, and conversations during and after attending camp.

At Wayside, Chris met Steve, whom I was mentoring at the time. My friend Steve was forming a business, Hope Analytics, and was looking to hire a support person. Chris and Steve met, and the computer language Chris was trained in at Dixon was exactly what Hope Analytics needed.

Going through the Master's Touch program helped to ground Chris in his relationship with God. After graduating (July 22) Chris began working for Hope Analytics. "Without a college degree and no real-world experience in the field of data engineering and software programming, God provided this job for me. God once again, like he'd done many times before, proved me and my outlook on life completely wrong." Chris

realized how real Proverbs 3:5-6 is, that we need to trust God in everything.

It has been fun the last year and a half to work with Chris and see him blossom in this new job after graduating from MT. Chris is a faithful servant here at Wayside. He helps many residents and staff with the wisdom and resources God has given him. "Most days I feel utterly and completely unworthy of these blessings. I realize God gave me these gifts for a reason and it's beyond all my understanding."

God is faithful and true. Since Chris' arrival, two other men have also come in from Dixon to Master's Touch. Chris has met with them and shared how God is faithful. "Work the program, and trust God has a plan for your life as He's shown me," he shares with them.

Today Chris loves his job, is engaged with his church, and gives back to Wayside as he can. Chris has experienced life transformation here at Wayside!!

Embracing the Future

I first met Craig Schuler in the fall of 2014. He had come to Wayside to help with a painting project, one of which was my own office. So while the first application of paint was drying and he was waiting to apply the second coat, Craig and I had a chance to sit and chat.

I knew that he was a former resident in our program, and I wanted to know more about his story and what brought him here.

Craig went on to explain that alcohol was the driving reason for his first stay at Wayside. He went on to talk of his upbringing, the poor friendships that he'd formed, along with the consequences that followed. I remember him saying, "I've been through a lot of dangerous situations in my life. I'm tough and nothing scares me." His next words were the most telling. "The one thing that scares me is alcohol."

Fast forward a couple of years later, when Craig entered our program again. His addiction again had a grip and was a formidable foe. As with many others who have relapsed and turn again to Wayside for help, I told him, "I am sorry to see you back, but I am so glad to see you back." Craig was staying in the fight for his sobriety.

Fast forward again to 2022, where we find Craig running his very own busy, successful painting company. Whenever I talk with him or see him, I always ask, "What's the number?" He then tells me the number of days. By the time you read this, our friend Craig is now over 2,190 days sober!

Having a front-row seat to witnessing transformation in people's lives is one of the great privileges that the Lord has given our staff. As a Wayside supporter, you are a part of Craig's story!
